



### **Noteworthy by Riley Redgate**


#### **Foolish Hearts by Emma Mills**


### **Dramarama by E. Lockhart**


### Playing a Part by Daria Wilke, Translated by Marian Shwartz

Following several openly gay characters in the Moscow puppet theater, the novel interrogates the intense dichotomy between the joy of theater and the hardedged anger towards queerness in Russian culture. The antagonism directed towards our protagonist, Grisha, for his incorrect performance of masculinity is heartbreaking. Although his mentor decides to move away to leave behind bigotry, Grisha finds strength through his theatrical experiences, and pushing against the oppression trying to crush him down.



### Dear Evan Hansen by Val Emmich, Steven Levenson, Benj Pasek and Justin Paul






# Will Grayson, Will Grayson by David Levithan and John Green

The tale of a pair of teens who meet by chance on a Chicago street corner and discover that they share a name and intertwining destinies involving an epic production of a high school musical.




### Take a Bow by Elizabeth Eulberg

Emme, Sophie, Ethan and Carter are seniors at a performing arts high school in New York City, preparing for the senior recital and feeling the pressure to perform well.




### **Saving Hamlet by Molly Booth**


### **Drama by Raina Telgemeier**

Designing sets for her middle school's play, Callie tries to overcome limited carpentry skills, low ticket sales, squabbling crew members and the arrival of two cute brothers.




### **Confessions of a Teenage Drama Queen by Dyan Sheldon**
